I just want to offer some reminders about two items today. They are from documents you have probably received previously in your email. I just want to emphasize the 2021 New Member Campaign and the change in Tubfrim.

I hope you are all doing well after this long season of pandemic. Just stay safe and know that it will be better before long.

Excerpts from “A Message from International President Ron Stubbings”

Information about 2021 New Member Campaign

1. Our Sons of Norway International Board of Directors has set a goal of **8,200 new social and financial benefits members**. That is a 5% increase over the actual number of 7,815 new members recruited in 2020.
2. While our organization goal is a 5% increase, your lodge is being asked to build on last year’s success by recruiting 4% more new members in 2021 than in 2020. For lodges that recruited 3 or fewer new members in 2020, the goal is 4 new members per lodge.
3. View the recruitment goal listing by district and lodge online, updated quarterly.

Recognition for Lodges and Members...

At the end of the campaign, lodges that meet the recruitment goal will be recognized with:

- **\$125 award**
- **Achievement Certificates** for the lodge and recruiting members

A stunning limited-edition 2021 Recruits Pin will be sent to members after they recruit their first new member in 2021.

Next is a letter from the David Crabb from the head office about Tubfrim:

Dear Lodge Leaders (and members)

...The program (Tubfrim) continues but is facilitated by the districts now, not Headquarters. Districts can choose to promote and participate in the program as they see fit. Individual members and lodge leaders should go to their Tubfrim district coordinators (**District IV Coordinator is President Nordy Riley**) with any issues, . . . regarding the program.

In addition, as the reimbursement for the annual drawing has stopped, SofN is no longer able to facilitate the \$1,000 prize drawing that has been part of this program in the past. This does not mean the stamps are no longer needed, or that the lodges should no longer participate in the program.. .

Bjørnetann Culture and Language Camp: The Bjørnetann Camp Board met a couple of weeks ago and made the painful decision to not move forward with the Montana camp for the 2020 season. They are intending to have camp for 2022. The situation

has been very fluid with the facility and CDC guidelines, and they have been told everything from no camp, camp but having to pod in groups of 10, only pre-packaged food, to they would have to cook just like they did at the Red Lodge campsite. The committee needs more instructors and more assistance with everything else. If you can help please contact Susan Gobbs (sggobbs@gmail.com) or Beth Morton (bmorton62@yahoo.com) with your thoughts and ideas.

Foundation News: I would like to use the rest of my space to cover some exciting Foundation news. It has been announced that Connie O'Brien, Fraternal Director, has been selected to be the new Foundation Director. They are in the process of hiring a full-time employee to assist her with the Foundation work.

One of the goals that was set by the Foundation Board of Governors is to increase the roster of the Foundation Directors in our Districts by 10%. We have 24 Foundation Directors in District 4 – 6 in our Canadian Lodges and 18 in our Montana and North Dakota. I understand that our Lodges having trouble filling all the positions, but I am asking that the 18 lodges without a Foundation Director please consider filling this position. This is a position that could be held by another officer - say the Counselor. The Lodge Foundation Directors will be our contact to the Lodges to pass on information about grants, scholarships, and fundraisers. Please let me know as soon as you fill this position.

Below is a report on the “Together We Are The Future” campaign. I want to personally thank the Lodges and the individuals in District IV who helped make this campaign such a great success.

Sons of Norway Foundation



2020 was a great year for the Sons of Norway Foundation. It was a great year because our lodges and members responded throughout the year, but especially during the ***Together We Are The Future*** campaign. The Sons of Norway Foundation Board of Governors thank you for your incredible support.

Since 1966, our Foundation has supported our members and lodges through scholarships, grants, and humanitarian relief.

In 2020, our members and lodges donated \$391,615. This included a \$90,000 legacy, a \$20,000 memorial, and a \$53,000 addition to an existing endowed scholarship.

And in 2020 the Foundation provided \$108,270 in 26 scholarships and \$27,330 in grants.

Donations to the ***Together We Are The Future*** campaign were \$210,164:

\$ 85,561 for endowed scholarships

\$ 17,013 for the humanitarian relief fund

\$ 106,590 unrestricted funds

Donations came from 721 members and 113 lodges. Our lodges donated \$29,585.

In District 4, 13 lodges donated during the Together campaign, with another 8 earlier in the year, for a total of 21 lodges during 2020.

Foundation Board of Governors will continue October as Foundation Month, extending it as the ***Together We Are The Future*** campaign through December.

As we move forward in 2021, here are some things we are asking our lodges to do:

- Consider appointing a lodge foundation director if you haven't done so,
- Publicize the purpose and benefits of the Foundation in your newsletters
- Encourage your members to apply for scholarships and grants
- Support the mission of the Foundation

Always remember: The Foundation is here for you . . . for good and forever.

Culture and Publicity

Our lodge, Mollargutten, has, hands down, the best Cultural Director anywhere. Carol Thompson is always coming up with brilliant ideas of things for us to do and learn about and she, herself, is skilled and creative in anything she does. If you are close enough to snag her for a lesson of almost any kind, grab her for some fun and entertainment. Let me tell you about one of our latest projects (under Carol's leadership, of course).

Norwegian Primstav Project

The Primstav is a wooden working calendar and almanac on a stick that was mostly used by rural Norwegians to keep track of religious/feast holidays, farming activities and other reoccurring key yearly events. It is set up to the 19-year metonic cycle that correlates to the lunar month and the solar year into a perpetual calendar. The Primstav has 366 marks, one for each day of the year plus one extra for leap year therefore 183 marks on each side of the stick and every seventh marks is longer or bigger to represent a new week. Each day had a label or title scribed next to a mark telling of its importance in the year. Many daily markings included runes or symbols for the said day. It was a reminder for rural Norwegians to keep aware of all religious holidays and attend church on all saintly holidays or they would be assessed a hefty fine (tax) by the government. The farming dates were divided into two categories, the summer or growing and the winter or consuming. Therefore, the Primstav stick is marked where the Summer Side starts on April 14th and the Winter Side starts on October 14th. The Primstav became obsolete when the written almanac was made.

Which reminds me, convention is just one year from now and I'm sure we will be looking for amazing cultural classes to present at the convention. As time goes by, we need to be sure those who are on the list are still willing and able to help out and add new people that are willing to step in and help.
