- Gyda Varden in Grand Forks sponsored author Eric Dregni on Saturday, October 9. He discussed his more than 20 books. This event was open to the public and members were encouraged to bring guests.

As of 8/31/21, Zone 2 had 1,327 members. The five lodges in Zone 2 all have returned to their membership meetings and social activities.

I have had the opportunity to meet personally with each lodge or members of the lodges in Zone 2.

In June, I attended Hjemdahl lodge in Valley City regular lodge meeting along with Elaine Nelson and Steve Halvorson. The meeting began with “Joke Time”. Several members contributed and a social time was enjoyed along with a light lunch. The program was an extremely informative video on the Hjemkomst Viking ship: The Robert Asp Story. The lodge is holding monthly meetings in the lower level of the Eagles Club.

Two lodge members and officers came from Cooperstown Lodge to Fargo for an inter-lodge dinner. I joined the two ladies at the dinner to share ideas, hear about lodge activities and functions held for potential membership recruitment. An outdoor picnic was held in July at President Ueland’s home. The event was well attended with about 30 people to enjoy the summer evening in a beautiful setting. Flags representing Norway were created. A game day with lunch was held at the local Bible camp with a fun, humorous movie: Lutefisk Wars. The lodge sold their building in November 2020. Meetings are being held in restaurants and other local venues, but plans are to return to the former lodge building when remodeling is completed and meeting space is available to rent.

On September 9, Kay and Steve Halvorson, Elaine Nelson, and John Andreason attended the Wahpeton Henrik Ibsen lodge membership recruitment dinner held at the Bagg Farm outside of Wahpeton. It was a farm to table dinner for about 30 people, prepared and served by Bagg Farm volunteers. Each of the

Fargo guests were part of the program and shared our thoughts and experiences in Sons of Norway. Elaine Nelson spoke on grants and scholarships, Steve Halvorson talked about the insurance component of SONS and benefits to members and lodges from the insurance policies. John Andreason told of his experiences of traveling to Norway as a student. Kay extended an invitation to the District 4 2022 convention to be held in Fargo. We had an informative visit with the lodge officers, shared in the camaraderie of the evening with singing, joke telling, and a wonderful meal. A special word of Congratulations went out to the Henrik Ibsen Lodge for an increase in membership over the last quarter.

Jamestown Wegeland Lodge has resumed their regular monthly membership meetings. The vice president has taken over lodge leadership after the resignation of the lodge president. The members celebrated Syttende Mai with a banquet, had a potluck picnic in August and sponsored a performance at Jamestown College funded by SONS grant money. I spoke with the secretary by phone and they are struggling with how to move forward in their lodge with the older members and lack of people willing to take on a leadership position.

Fargo Kringen Lodge has a full calendar of events while they continue to work on membership recruitment and retention and cultural programming. In June, a successful \$1,000,000 capital campaign was completed. Funds were used to renovate the kitchen, update the facility and replenish the reserve fund. Lutefisk dinners, Tuesday evening dinners, daily noon lunches, Norwegian waffle night and torsk club all keep the volunteers busy and the kitchen open. Monthly cultural events have been well attended along with participation in rosemaling, wood carving, language classes, accordion band and ukulele band.

For me personally, this has been a fun, growing year. I have had opportunities to learn more about the SONS organization and programming and to visit other lodges. I observed members enjoying returning to open meetings and lodges becoming more active.

Lodges in Zone 3 are doing the best they can. Most had at least one picnic or more during the summer. Very few business meetings.



Sverdrup is having their lutefisk dinner in October this year. They have planned that the socials will be held at the Eagles Club in Bismarck with a meal and a Norwegian program each month. Language classes have started. They are having a benefit auction for the Foundation.

Vennlig Lodge has a new slate of officers and are making plans to meet this fall. They are going to continue as a lodge and it will work well for them.

Hardanger Lodge meets weekly on cultural classes so they are doing well.

Vidda Lodge meets regularly and is planning on their Taste of Norway in October. The other lodges all have activities planned for the fall with meetings and socials.

Thor Lodge participated in the Midsummer Night Party in June. There were over 1,500 people in attendance on Friday night and at least 800 on Saturday. Thor Lodge sold over 250 root beer floats. My sorority sold slices of Norwegian almond cake. One sorority sister made 25 of the almond cakes. Daughters of Norway sold pieces of kransakake. All of these treats were sold out quickly. On Saturday there were 8 classes/lectures of heritage for people to attend. Thor Lodge had two sessions for the youth where they made a Norwegian flag. Over 80 youth attended these 2 classes.

Thor Lodge will have a raffle with proceeds to be

for the Foundation. The Heritage Park is staffed by volunteers every day during the summer. I am a tour guide at the Stave Church on Thursday afternoons and my records showed that over 5,500 people visited the church this summer. A very busy park. A place to share our heritage.

All lodges are meeting and doing what they can in their communities to share their heritage.

We Just Thought You Should Know

At our Fall Board meeting, we discussed some of the new changes that have come about at the head office. Dan Rude addressed our questions to Connie O'Brien as to why the Cultural Skills forms would now be judged locally and not from the head office as has been done in the past. We also wondered about the printing of membership applications. Below are pertinent parts of the response that was given.

Hi Dan,

Regarding the sports programs and cultural skills, we did move to align how both are handled. The sports medals were always handled more on the honor system and awarded by the sports director who received the information from the member. The goal was to encourage activity and engagement to this part of the culture. I adjusted the cultural skills to follow suit when I learned that we were not really doing anything differently than acknowledging what the member told us they achieved. We were using a valuable staff resource to receive, process and mail cultural skills medals to members and sometimes just based on her deep knowledge she would include a nice note about the work. But we did not truly judge them.

When I started working with Fraternal and realized the time and money we used for this process, I dug deeper. Then I discovered that the person who was receiving the info and packaging up the medals was more knowledgeable about Nordic culture than anyone on staff. She speaks, writes, and edits Norwegian! That was the start of moving the manual labor to a vendor and freeing her up to do more impactful work, like The Blinding Sea documentary for all members, the solitaire game and many other cultural digital experiences. She has a new documentary coming out this fall, can't wait to tell you more about this digital event!

While I realize this moved some things around for members, I did the research and about 5% of our members leverage our cultural skills medal program and in two districts they prefer not to get the medal and produce their own certificates. I have had many calls about this topic but after explaining what we gained by this move, most are understanding. I continue to look for ways that the Foundation or select member can support this program but have not landed on anything yet.

The person who I am referring to is Jana Velo and she has since been promoted to editor of our Viking magazine where she is knocking it out of the park. She took over the Viking and E-post early this year and I am totally amazed at her work and progress. Yet it breaks my heart to think we wasted 7 years of her talent stuffing little boxes. Hard decisions to make but I know by the work she has provided Sons it was the right decision. I always wish I had more staff, as I would love to execute every idea and do more for our members! But as you know budgets are always the battle we face each fall.

We did stop printing member applications as with Covid lodges were not ordering and we of course want to drive as much to the on-line sign up as possible. We do honor lodges and send when they ask (Doris and Sherry have a hard time saying no). Emily and I brought a large supply up to Fargo when we went. But we do try to manage the print budget, if possible, as we know lodges order more than they need and then when they get outdated it is a waste. I am happy to revisit this at any point if we start to feel it is slowing our growth!

Lutefisk!!

I have been to a couple of lutefisk dinners this fall. Bless his heart, my full-blooded German husband goes with me and gorges himself on the meatballs and lefse. Lutefisk—no thanks. I like lutefisk. I even eat it without butter.

The most recent lutefisk dinner that I attended was yesterday afternoon at the St. Olaf Church in Devils Lake. The meal was delicious in every way. I couldn't count the pieces of lefse Mike ate, but what caught my eye was the PILE of lutefisk on a nearby plate. I saw a few pieces of herring on the plate along with the lutefisk. I didn't see anything else. We had to butter our own lefse at the table. I noticed that the PILE of lutefisk person likes lefse almost as much as the lutefisk.

All this has brought me to thinking about lutefisk. I know that lutefisk came about as a way of preserving the fish. I wonder why we still eat it like that. It is a lengthy process one must go through to make lutefisk. Why don't we just freeze the fish and send it to the grocery store? I wonder which is the best way to cook it? I looked for pictures of lutefisk on the internet, but I couldn't find a single picture that looks like my kind of lutefisk. Maybe they don't cook it in a large enamel kettle like my mom used. Maybe they were really eating something else in those photos?

I found some interesting information in an article by Matt Sulem published in The Daily Meal:

“Lutefisk is whitefish — which refers to several species of finned fish such as cod, ling, or burbot — that has been air-dried and may or may not be salted. (The unsalted version is also known as “stockfish.”) It is first soaked in cold water for five or six days, with the water changed daily. The now-saturated fish is then soaked again for two days in an unchanged solution of cold water and lye. Lye, for the record, is a substance obtained by leaching ashes, and is also known as sodium hydroxide. After this weeklong process, the fish loses half of its protein and gains a jelly-like consistency. At this point it is also caustic (you may remember lye as the stuff Tyler Durden used in *Fight Club* to cause chemical burns and also make soap), so it needs another four to six days of soaking in cold water, refreshed daily, before it is ready to be cooked. Since the saturated fish is quite delicate, a layer of salt is added about a half-hour before it is cooked. This releases some of the water being held. It is then placed in a sealed pan and steam cooked on low heat for 20-25 minutes or wrapped in aluminum foil and baked at 435 degrees F for 40-50 minutes.”

I'm pretty sure Mom never timed the cooking of the fish. I think those older Norwegians just had a feel for that kind of thing. I remember that she picked her lutefisk from cow watering tanks that Super Pete had outside of his grocery store from about this time of year until after the first of the new year. Gone now are Pederson's Super Valu and the water tanks. I hope they still have lutefisk in Starbuck MN.

May your lutefisk season never end!!
