In 1928 Ditlef Frantzen, postmaster of the small Norwegian town of Nesbyen, got the idea to collect and market canceled stamps as a way of raising funds for the Tuberculosis Association in Norway. Within a few years, his idea caught on and many communities in Norway and beyond

were canceled

collecting and sending bags of stamps to Nesbyen.


Frantzen left Nesbyen in he donated his stamp collecting institution to Health Service. Since

the Norwegian Health Service. Since tuberculosis is no longer the threat to health that it once was, today disabled and needy children receive the proceeds from the resale of the stamps. Last year Tubfrim made a profit of 520,000 Kroner (that's almost \$80,000).

How can I help?

To help Tubfrim do its crucial work, simply clip canceled stamps from envelopes, leaving at least a quarter of an inch around the edge.

When you have of stamps, ask chairperson or weigh and verify your stamps in a send it in a sturdy

Before mailing them, ask your Tubfrim chairman to find out how to get your stamps to a place where they can be taken to Norway.

Sons of Norway members visited one of the five stones at the same elevation in the Turtle Mountains near Bottineau that have triangular holes reputed to be mooring stones for Viking ships. The theory is that Vikings traversed a giant inland sea that once covered a wide swath of North Dakota, and they arrived here before Columbus 'discovered' America. Similar holes have been found on the Minnesota side of former Glacial Lake Agassiz. Native Americans did not have metal tools to create triangular holes and you can see the chisel marks. In addition, an



8-foot wide and 13-foot log dugout lined with rocks in which no mortar was used in its construction was found. Naturally, one would like definite proof; we will keep looking for a 14<sup>th</sup> century sign that says, «Ole was here.» This information came to me from Glenda Fauske, President of the Bottineau Lodge.
