Ingredients

5 Tbsp. coffee (medium grind works best)

1 egg

Instructions

Beat egg in a small bowl with a fork. Add coffee grounds and mix until you have a sludge.

Bring 7 cups of water to a boil in a large coffee pot or saucepan. Add coffee/egg mixture. Continue boiling until the foam disappears – about 3 minutes. Remove from heat.

Add 1 cup of cold water to the coffee pot. This will help settle the grounds.

Pour coffee through a strainer to catch any loose grounds. Serve.

Dues Change

Recently word was received from the International Board of Directors that there will be a dues change for our members. Below is the letter that was received from Ron Stubbings, International President, explaining the change.

Dear District Leaders,

Last week you received an email regarding a change in membership dues effective July 1, 2024. This message is to clarify the changes and hopefully help answer any questions you may have, specifically related to the portion going back to the lodge and to the district.

- Single member dues will increase by \$2 per month for a total annual increase of \$24. Effective July 1, 2024, single member annual dues will be \$84. One dollar of the annual increase will be given to the local lodge and the district. The district lodge portion of the annual dues will increase from \$14 per individual member to \$15 per individual member. The local lodge portion of the annual dues will increase from \$14 per individual member to \$15 per individual member.
- Family membership will increase by \$4 per month for a total annual increase of \$48. Effective July 1, 2024, the family member dues will be \$144. The district portion of the annual dues increase for family membership will increase from \$25 per family membership to \$27 per family membership. The local lodge portion of the annual dues will increase from \$28 to \$30 per family membership.
- Dues for members in Canada and Norway will increase based on the percentage increase for US members. (40% increase for single members,19% increase for family members)

The dues increase will be effective on July 1, 2024, therefore renewals from that date forward will be at the new rate. If the members' dues were due before July 1, 2024, and payment is received after that date they will still be under the old structure. Likewise, if a renewal is due after July 1 and the member paid it early in June it should be at the new increased rate. A message will be added to the invoices regarding the dues increase starting with the July 2024 invoices.

Please note that in the April Leadership Resource email lodge leaders will receive communication regarding this dues change. This is scheduled to go to lodge leaders on April 18th.

Hallo Alle (Hello Everyone)!

This is one phrase in Norwegian that is the same as the German I learned in high school. It also works in English too. Imagine that! Of course, with differences in pronunciation.

Well, we made it through another winter in western and west central Montana. Not the worst in the record books but we had some of the extreme cold the state is known for. Unlike North Dakota we normally have chinooks so the cold doesn't stay as long but the higher altitudes can lead to even lower temperatures. The lowest reading ever recorded in the lower 48 states was in Rogers Pass Montana, between Helena and Lincoln (the town no longer exists but the pass does), at 70 below zero Fahrenheit. Because of the chinook effect, the largest temperature change of 103 degrees Fahrenheit in 24 hours, officially recorded on earth, occurred in Loma Montana (between Great Falls and Havre) in the winter of 1972. Enough about the winter weather!

My report on activities in Zone 6 follows:

Great Falls (Lodsen 4-138) - A movie night with a showing of "The Kings Choice" was included in the Lodge's January social meeting. March's activity included a family game which included a game of Bingo/Norge and desserts. I need to learn how to play Bingo/Norge! Their April activity will be a movie night social with Fools in the Mountains playing. They are running into an issue with the fair booth normally manned during the Montana State Fair because of a new requirement for a fire suppression unit. Planning for volunteers to assist in the Salvation Army Christmas bell ringers for Christmas 2024 is already underway for the lodge. Like many lodges they are struggling to find volunteers for all their officer positions.

Kalispell (Fedraheimen 4-140) - In January I ice skated my way to Kalispell to attend a special board meeting they scheduled to fall the day before the Polson board meeting.
